 - Options for addressing different scenarios

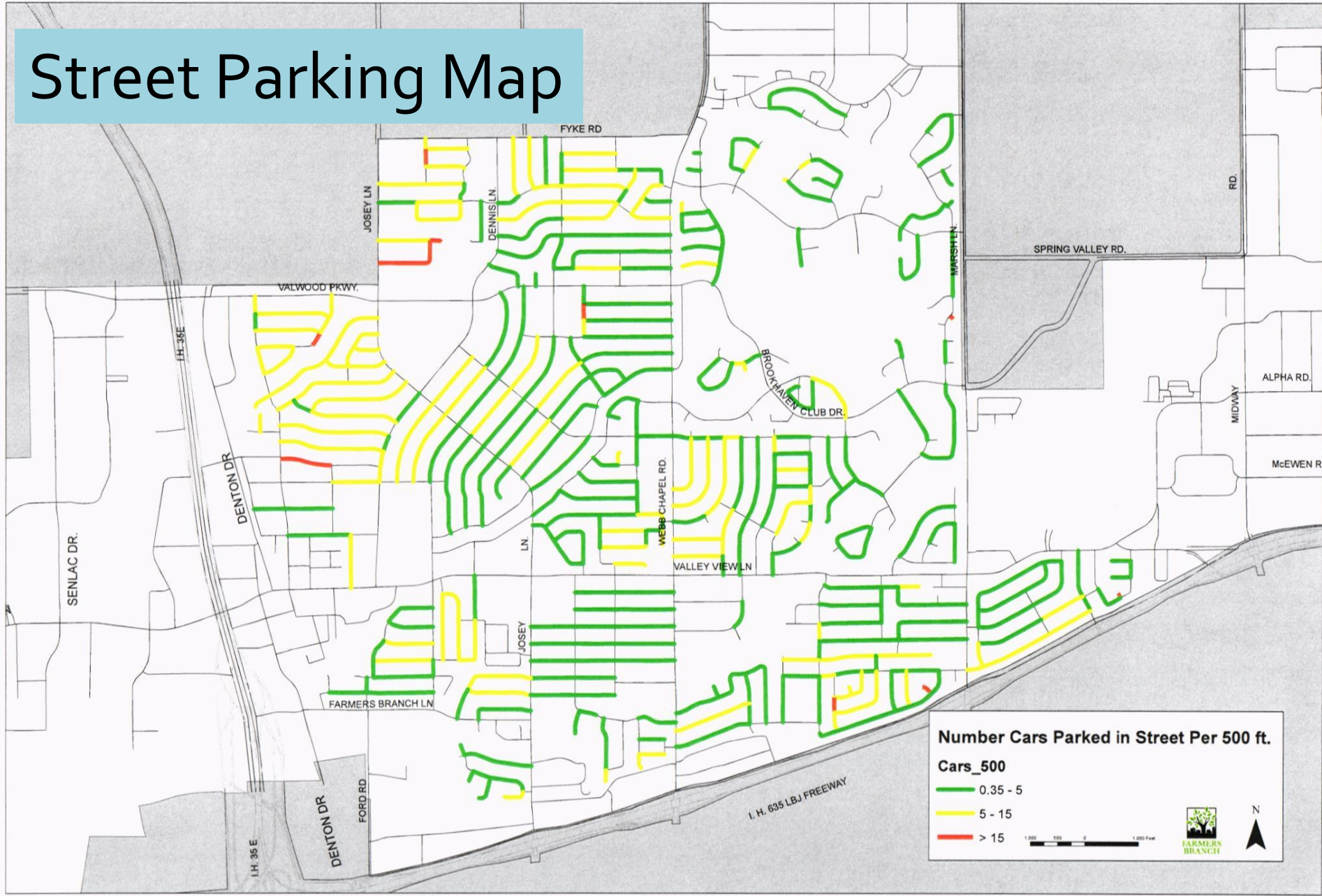
Council Direction

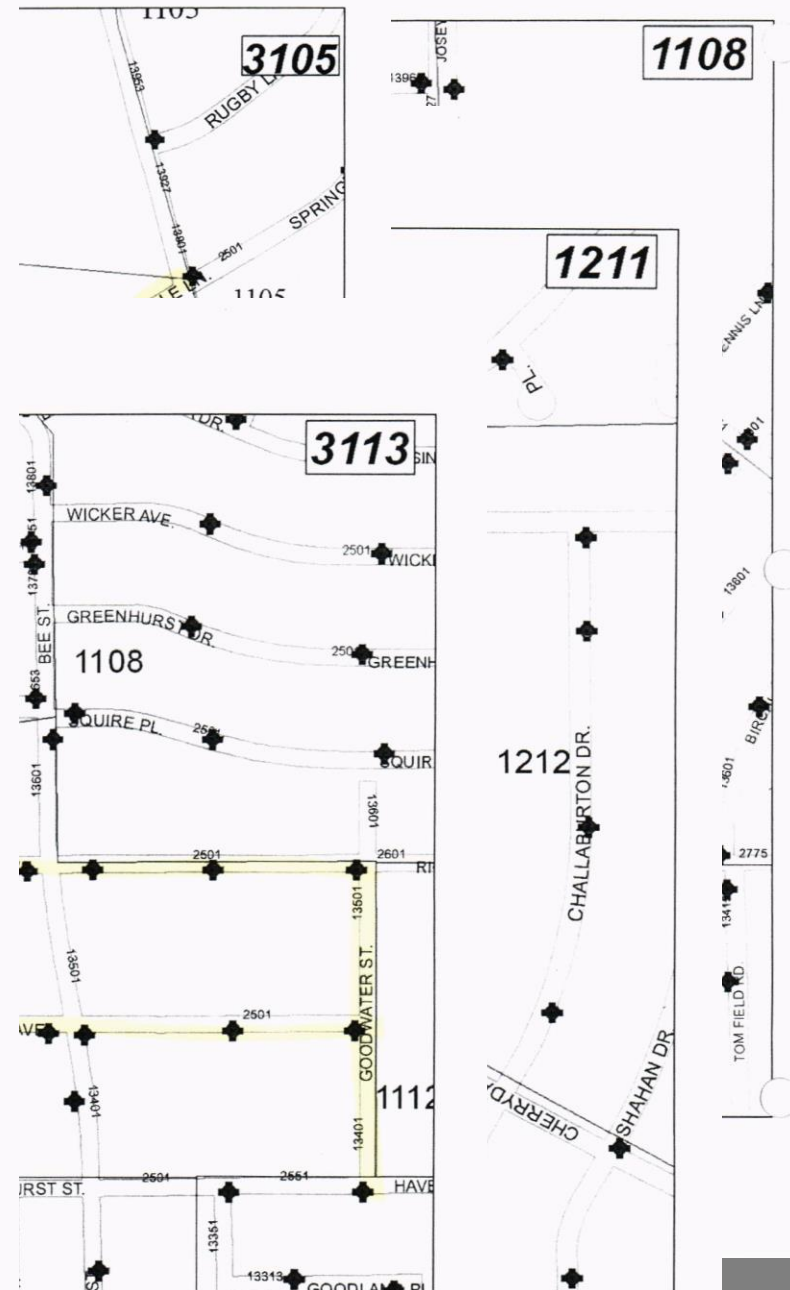
- Following the presentation City Council directed City Administration to draft an ordinance for Council's consideration that:
 - Provided options to the City Council
 - Addressed different parking problems

Collected Data

- City Administration collected data relating to:
 - The number of vehicles parked on a street
 - The ability of large fire equipment to traverse specific streets
 - Police calls regarding parking violations on a street

Neighborhood Meeting

- Explain Issue, Discuss Possible Solutions

Report Results From Neighborhood Meeting

- Report to City Council, Receive Direction from City Council

Draft Ordinance for Council Approval – If Necessary

Ordinance No 3253

- Establishes possible Council action regarding parking restrictions if residents fail to voluntarily take steps to reduce the number of motor vehicles parked on the streets
 - Prohibit parking on one or both sides of the street
 - Prohibit parking for more than 48 hours
 - Require vehicle parking permit
 - Limit the number of vehicles in the street per household
 - Prohibit overnight parking or prohibit parking at specified times
