April 27, 2022 - Redistricting Commission voted unanimously (11 Yes / 0 No) for Map 6 as the primary recommendation and Map 4 as the secondary recommendation.

May 11, 2022 (Post Election) - Redistricting Commission voted unanimously (10 Yes / 0 No) for Map 7 to supersede Map 6 as the Commission's primary recommendation.

September 14, 2022 (1st Reconvene) - Redistricting Commission voted unanimously (9 Yes / 0 No) to keep the original recommendation of Map 7 with regards to new Maps 8 & 9.

November 9, 2022 (2nd Reconvene) - Redistricting Commission voted 6 Yes / 4 No in favor of Map 8 over Map 9 and concluded with a final vote of 8 Yes / 2 No in favor of Map 7 over Map 8.

Farmers Branch, Texas - Code of Ordinances CHARTER

ARTICLE VII. - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

Sec. 7.10. Establishment, review and revision of Council District boundaries.

- (a) The City is divided into five (5) districts, known as Districts 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 as described in the Judgment of United States District Court in Fabela v. City of Farmers Branch, No. 3:10-CV-1425-D (N.D. Tex.) (January 31, 2018).
- (b) The Council shall appoint a redistricting commission, starting in January 2022, and every ten (10) years thereafter, to review the District boundaries in order to maintain a substantial equality of population in each District. The redistricting commission shall advise the Council, which shall within six (6) months after appointment fix the boundaries of the Districts by ordinance, if necessary. The Mayor and each member of the Council shall appoint at least one member of the redistricting commission. The Council shall designate the chair of the redistricting commission. In making such appointments, the Council shall, as nearly as may be practicable, provide fair and balanced representation of all geographical areas of the city in the redistricting process and provide a total membership that reflects the racial and ethnic makeup of the city's population. Members of the redistricting commission shall be appointed to serve a term that will end upon completion of the redistricting commission's work. Persons appointed to the redistricting commission must be qualified voters and meet the qualifications for service on a City board. A member of the Council is not eligible for appointment to the redistricting commission. A member of the redistricting commission is not eligible to be a candidate for Council in the next succeeding general election of the city, and may not be appointed or elected to the Council for a period of one year after service on the redistricting commission.
- (c) The redistricting commission shall draw the districts in compliance with the following guidelines:
 - (1) The districts shall be substantially equal in population according to the total population count as presented in the census data, except where deviation is required to comply with federal law or is allowable by law;
 - (2) In addition to the requirements of federal law, there shall be no discrimination on the basis of race, color, or membership in a language minority group, and the voting strength of racial, ethnic, and language minorities in the districts shall not be diluted to deprive minority voters of an equal opportunity to elect a candidate of their choice;
 - (3) The districts shall be geographically compact, to the extent possible, and composed of contiguous territory;
 - (4) The reconfiguration of districts shall be neutral as to incumbents or potential candidates; and
 - (5) To the extent practicable, communities of interest shall be placed in a single district and attempts should be made to avoid splitting neighborhoods, where possible, without violating the other requirements or applicable laws.

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RESOLUTION NO. 2021-166



A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERS BRANCH, TEXAS, ADOPTING CRITERIA FOR USE IN 2022 REDISTRICTING PROCESS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, this City Council of the City of Farmers Branch, Texas, (the "Council") has certain responsibilities for redistricting under federal and state law including, but not limited to, Amendments 14 and 15 to the United States Constitution, U.S.C.A.; Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, 52 U.S.C.A. §10301; Section 7.10 of the City Charter; and Tex. Gov't Code Ann. §§ 2058.001 and 2058.002; and

WHEREAS, a review of the 2020 census data reveals that a population imbalance exists among the City's councilmember districts requiring redistricting of those districts; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City to comply with the Voting Rights Act and with all other relevant law, including *Shaw v. Reno* jurisprudence and Section 7.10 of the City Charter; and

WHEREAS, a set of established redistricting criteria will serve as a framework to guide the City in the formulation and consideration of districting plans; and

WHEREAS, redistricting criteria will provide the City a means by which to evaluate proposed plans; and

WHEREAS, redistricting criteria will assist the City in its efforts to comply with all applicable federal and state laws; and

WHEREAS, Section 7.10 of the City Charter requires the Council to appoint a redistricting commission (the "Commission") to review the 2020 census data as it relates to council district boundaries and to advise the Council on how to fix the boundaries of the various council districts in order to maintain substantial equality of population within each council district; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmers Branch, Texas, finds it to be in the public interest to establish criteria to be followed by the Commission and the City Council in reviewing the exiting council district boundaries and revising those boundaries to conform with applicable federal and state law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMERS BRANCH, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. The following criteria are hereby adopted and shall, to the greatest extent possible, be followed by the Commission in reviewing and recommending the revisions to council district boundaries and by the City Council in the adoption of such revised boundaries:

A. To the extent practicable:

- (1) Easily identifiable geographic boundaries should be followed;
- Communities of interest should be maintained in a single district, and attempts should be made to avoid splitting neighborhoods;
- (3) Councilmember districts should be composed of whole voting precincts; provided, however, when the foregoing is not possible or practicable, districts should be drawn considering county election precincts;
- (4) Avoid splitting census blocks unless necessary;
- (5) While recognizing existing district boundaries will need to be altered to reflect new population distribution in the City, any districting plan should be based on existing districts;
- Districts must be configured so they are relatively equal in total population according to the 2020 federal census. In no event should the total population deviation between the largest and the smallest district exceed ten percent (10%) as compared to the ideal precinct size;
- (7) The districts should be compact and composed of contiguous territory. Compactness may contain a functional, as well as a geographical, dimension;
- (8) Consideration may be given to the preservation of incumbent-constituency relations by recognition of the residence of incumbents and their history in representing certain areas;
- (9) The plan should be narrowly tailored to avoid racial gerrymandering in violation of Shaw v. Reno;
- (10) The plan should not fragment a geographically compact minority community or pack minority voters in the presence of polarized voting or otherwise discriminate against protected groups so as to create liability under the Voting Rights Act;
- (11) Any plan shall comply with the criteria set forth in Section 7.10(c) of the City Charter. To the extent of any irreconcilable conflict between the criteria set forth in this resolution and Section 7.10(c) of the City Charter, the provisions of the City Charter shall prevail.
- **B.** The Commission and the City Council will review all plans considering these criteria and will evaluate how well each plan conforms to the criteria.
- C. Any plan submitted to the City Council by a citizen or other third party for its consideration should be a complete plan—i.e., it should include all 5 councilmember

- districts and should redistrict the entire City. The Commission and the City Council may decline to consider any plan that is not a complete plan.
- **D.** All plans submitted by citizens, as well as plans submitted by staff, consultants, and members of the City Council should conform to these criteria.

SECTION 2. This resolution shall be effective immediately upon approval.
